The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) received the submitted information for the above referenced project on February 22, 2023. According to the provided materials, the project consists of the extension and improvement of the Chugnut Trail located near 607 S Grippen Ave, Endicott, NY 13760 (Grippen Park).

Based upon our review of your inquiry, DEC offers the following comments:

PROTECTION OF WATERS

The Susquehanna River (NYS Water Index #: SR), a Class A navigable waterbody, is within close proximity to the project site.

A Protection of Waters permit is required to physically disturb the bed or banks (up to 50 feet from stream) of any streams identified as "protected." A permit is not required to disturb the bed or banks of "non-protected" streams. A Protection of Waters permit is required for any excavation or filling below the Mean High-Water Level (MHWL) of any waterbodies and contiguous wetlands identified as "navigable." For more information, please visit https://www.dec.ny.gov/permits/6554.html.

Although a Protection of Waters permit does not appear to be required, please note, however, the project sponsor is responsible for ensuring that work shall not pollute any potential nearby stream or waterbody. Care shall be taken to prevent contamination of any stream or waterbody by silt, sediment, fuels, solvents, lubricants, or any other pollutant associated with the project.

FRESHWATER WETLANDS

The project site is not within a New York State protected Freshwater Wetland. However, please contact your town officials and the United States Army Corps of Engineers Auburn Field Office, at (315) 255-8090, for any permitting they might require.



STATE-LISTED SPECIES

DEC has reviewed the State's Natural Heritage records. We have determined that the site (9CRS31) is located within or near record(s) of the following state-listed species: Bald Eagle (Haliaeetus leucocephalus).

Please be aware, pursuant to Article 11, Title 5, Section 535 of the Environmental Conservation Law, Threatened and Endangered Species, an "Incidental Take" Permit may be required from the DEC for any project if it is determined that a take of a threatened or endangered species will occur. However, DEC has determined that no adverse impacts to Bald Eagles are anticipated to result from this project. Therefore, an Article 11 Permit is not required for this project. The absence of data does not necessarily mean that rare or state-listed species, natural communities or other significant habitats do not exist on or adjacent to the proposed site. Rather, our files currently do not contain information which indicates their presence. For most sites, comprehensive field surveys have not been conducted. 

WHEREAS, the following items have been agreed upon between Broome County Department of Public Works and Cornell Cooperative Extension (CCE) regarding operation and care of the Forget-Me-Not Memorial Garden located at 6-1/2 Sturges Street in the City of Binghamton, and

WHEREAS, Broome County agrees to increase Cornell Cooperative Extension's annual budget by \$5,000 to cover the cost of garden maintenance, and

WHERES, Cornell Cooperative Extension agrees to provide staff and materials for the annual maintenance and care of the garden beds and plant materials, now, therefore, be

RESOLVED, that this County Legislature authorizes a Memorandum of Understanding between the County of Broome and Cornell Cooperative Extension for care and maintenance of the Forget-Me-Not Memorial Garden as follows:

- 1. CCE will provide spring preparation of the garden beds including post-winter cleanup. This work will include but not be limited to removal of winter debris (leaves, sticks, litter, etc.), pre-season pruning / trimming based on plant material needs, and bed mulching as specified below.
- 2. Initial garden bed mulching design included placement of hardwood bark mulch at a thickness of 2-3 inches over all ground surfaces except the concrete walkway. The total lot area is approximately 138' X 36' resulting in a total mulch volume of approximately 45 tons (+/- 30 CY). CCE will assure sufficient mulch coverage to retain moisture and discourage weed growth. It will be the responsibility of CCE to purchase and place mulch on site as needed.
- 3. During the growing season CCE will monitor the garden planting beds as needed including periodic watering, weeding, and mulching. Water for garden use is provided onsite, CCE will need to provide hoses, sprinklers, etc.
- 4. At the conclusion of the growing season in the fall, CCE will provide end of season garden preparation and plant protection.

- 5. During this first year of the maintenance agreement (summer 2023), an initial onsite inspection will be performed by Broome County to determine what plant material did not survive the winter season. Because the garden is newly constructed, the site contractor is under warranty to replace plant material through this period (ending October 31, 2023). CCE will work through DPW to coordinate replacement of plant material under warranty. After this warranty period, replacement of plant material will be the responsibility of CCE under this agreement. The County would like plant material replaced in kind where possible, and/or anticipates that CCE will notify the County should material substitution be required.
- 6. Under this agreement repair and/or replacement of hardscape; including concrete walkways, benches, signage, and fencing will be the responsibility of Broome County. The County requests that CCE immediately notify the County should there be any damage to hardscape identified that requires repair. Additionally, CCE should notify the County if there are any additional vandalism issues noted that required attention by Broome Security (including illegal dumping).
